IF I HAD IT TO DO OVER, I WOULD HAVE...

Is the Class of '67 special or what? We have so many talented members of our Class and that makes every communication and gathering we have especially meaningful at this stage in our lives. I find that each time we meet or I browse Debbie Gandy McBride's brilliant website, or read Alice Mabry's exceptional quarterly newsletter, I learn something about a class member that makes me want to know more about them. We weren't all friends in high school but we share a common bond of growing up and going to school together which cannot be matched in any other affiliation we have.

In thinking along those lines, I thought that one way to get to know each other better is to share some experience that we had which we regret and wish could have been different. That leads to another common bond I suspect most of us have. We have so much "wisdom" because of our experiences that we would like to pass on to our children and people we care about, but if your case is like mine, you may be humored but no one really wants to hear your advice!

I have so many "regrets" that I decided to think of the very first one I can remember and perhaps share others in future newsletters. I hope my sharing will encourage each of you to have a memory you would like to share to express something you wish you had done differently. This type of sharing requires some vulnerability and tossing away of pride that we have always been perfect, but I believe we will find many things we could come to a consensus about in sharing life lessons.

So here goes my first share:

Many of you might be surprised to hear that I was a tomboy growing up. If you consider that my playmates were four rough and rowdy brothers, you might appreciate that any time not spent holed up in my bedroom was spent with them. When I was 7-8 years old, we lived in a big old yellow house which was located at the end of a lane and surrounded by woods and a huge field. On the other side of that field there were railroad tracks which almost always had stationary cars on them.

One of our favorite things to do was lope through that field and hunt for blackberries. In actuality you could find the blackberries much easier if you walked on top of the train and

jumped across the hookup to the next car. My oldest brother did this all the time but refused to let me climb up and enjoy the hunt. It was to my greatest delight to find myself as the "elder" sibling one day, bringing two of my younger brothers along.

You have probably guessed by now that I climbed right up the ladder and proceeded to walk and hunt. It was either my first or second jump across that fell short and I found myself with a huge gash in my bottom left chin and jaw. I should say my brothers found me that way because I lost consciousness. Those dear boys, aged 6 and 5, dragged me across the field yelling the whole way, "Vanesa's dead!" I am not sure when I became conscious but the first thing I remember was having stitches and being told I was lucky to be alive.

As a consequence of my actions, I was never allowed to go blackberry hunting again and I have lived with that scar for my entire life. I hardly think of it now but it was prominent to me in my younger years.

So, this is my first memorable regret. **IF I HAD IT TO DO OVER, I WOULD HAVE** listened to my older brother and never, ever gotten on top of that train.


I hope you enjoyed this story and I challenge each of you to share something for our next newsletter.
